Apsley House: The Wellington Museum

originally known as No.1 London Apsley House was built by Robert Adam between 1771 and 1778 for Baron Apsley. It was the home from 1817 to 1852 of Arthur Wellesley, 1st Duke of Wellington, the hero of the Peninsular War & Waterloo and a leading British statesman and Prime Minister. The interior decoration was restored by the Victoria and Albert Museum and is an example of revived Louis XIV style popular in the early 19th century, with ornate plasterwork, beautiful chandeliers and solid silver candelabra.

paintings of Old Masters adorn the walls including the famous Goya painting of Wellington on horseback. Other interesting items about or collected by the Duke include a series of caricatures of him and some of his uniforms and garter robes

opening: the building has occasional special open days. The Changing of the Guard ceremony takes place daily 11.00 (10.00 Suns)

this former office of the Duke of Wellington has memorabilia about the man and his life

a collection in the Musuem records the British army's activities over 5 centuries from 1415 and includes the story of a soldier in Wellington's army and some of Wellington's personal relics

Arthur Wellesley, 1st Duke of Wellington

this statue of 1848 by Thomas Milne was removed here from the Tower of London in 1863 to commemorate the Duke receiving the Master-Generalship of the Ordnance at Woolwich

the Gallery has five portraits of famous people on horseback including another by Goya of the Duke of Wellington painted 1812-1814

this home for veterans of the regular army was founded in 1682 by King Charles II. The museum has mementoes of Wellington as part of its collection on the history of the hospital and its members. Have a look at the drawing of the Duke of Wellington catafalque that lay in state in the Great Hall before burial at St Paul's

Grenadier pub

this pub stands on the site of stables where the Duke of Wellington kept his horses. The mounting block outside is said to have been used by the Duke. The pub is now decorated as befits its name - a sentry box outside and memorabilia such as bayonettes, sabres and a bearskin inside

Duke of Wellington pub

the frontage of this pub is designed like an antique shop with a collection of Wellington memorabilia in one window. From a blocked upper window an image of the Duke with tankard in his hand looks down

inside there is more memorabilia - pictures, a cheque he gave someone, and a signpost pointing (in all the wrong directions) to the battles he won!

Achilles

Hyde Park, on the ring road from Hyde Park Corner to Marble Arch, W1

this nude bronze statue by Sir Richard Westmacott was erected in 1822 as a memorial to Wellington. Although called Achilles it is in fact not Achilles nor does it have the face of Wellington. Cast from cannon captured at the Peninsular War it stands 18ft (5.4m) high, weighs 33 tons and is the copy of a Roman horse trainer

incidentally the size of the fig leaf has been occasionally ridiculed and has been chipped off twice (1870 and 1961)

outside this London club are the horse mounting blocks placed there by the Duke of Wellington

Wellington is commemorated, along with other famous military leaders, in the Cathedral. Alfred Steven's bronze and marble statue of the Duke on his horse, Copenhagen, was begun in 1857 but not finished until 1911. A canopied monument and a ruddy brown porphyry sarcophagi also remember the Duke

in the Cathedral Library there is a model of the Duke's funeral car. It looks very similar to a very large Hindi carriage often used in religious festivals

various monuments adorned with lions, cherubs and allegorical figures commemorate political figures including Winston Churchill, Lord Nelson, the Duke of Wellington and William Pitt the Elder. These can be found in the Great Hall. Friezes round the statue of the Duke show scenes of some of the battles he led

another equestrian statue of the Duke shows him riding stirrupless. Begun by Sir Francis Legatt Chantrey it was completed by Henry Weekes in 1844

a long-established outfitter, this shop has supplied shirts to many famous historical figures including the Duke of Wellington and Lord Nelson

this equestrian statue of 1887 by Sir Joseph Edgar Boehm was cast from captured guns. It shows the Duke, mounted on his horse Copenhagen. Around the statue are the guardsmen figures of a 1st Guard, a 42nd Royal Highlander, a 23rd Royal Welsh Fusilier and a 6th Inniskilling Dragoon

in the Royal Gallery are two large victory paintings (45' x 12' (13.7x3.7 m)) painted by Daniel Maclise between 1858 and 1865. One shows the death of Nelson at Trafalgar and the other the meeting of Wellington and Blucher at Waterloo

among the collection in this major art gallery is an interesting painting by Sir Edwin Henry Landseer (1803-73) entitled 'A dialogue at Waterloo'. Painted in 1850 it is an imaginary painting of Wellington visiting the site of the Battle of Waterloo with his daughter

scenes of famous local landmarks have been used to decorate this underpass under Hyde Park Corner. They illustrate the history of the Battle of Waterloo, Rotten Row

in Hyde Park, Harrods the famous department store, Knightsbridge, the Household cavalry stabled nearby, activities in Hyde Park including swimming, cycling, rowing and fireworks, the Serpentine and the Great Exhibition of 1851
