a display ranging from pocket watches to grandfather clocks covering the period of the 16th to 20th centuries. Of special interest is a chequered oak clock with mother-of-pearl face & black stencilled design by Charles Rennie Mackintosh, the Scottish architect, designer and artist (1868-1928); and the Strasbourg Clock.

this carillon clock with automata was made in 1589. An astronomical dial shows the position of the sun and moon in the zodiac and a calendar provides the date. A revolving carousel shows the days of the week represented by the ruling planet riding as a person in a chariot. The automata moves and music plays when the clock strikes at every hour and quarter. The gilt metal frame is engraved with the figures of Faith, Hope, Charity, Wisdom, Fortitude & Justice

The collection began in 1814 and is the oldest specific collection of clocks and watches in the world. Among the longcase clocks is one of 1705 by John May and one in marquetry by George Stratford

the Museum also houses the library of manuscripts and books dating from 1813 of the Clockmakers Company, a City of London Livery Company

this collection is considered one of the best in the world for French 18th century paintings, porcelain and furniture including clocks. Of interest is an example of a Regulateur clock, a precision pendulum wall clock where the centre

hour dial is arranged so that the hour hand never blocks the second hand. This was of special importance when used in observatories and factories

a lovely example of 18th century decorative art is the gilded Avignon Clock. The face is set on a rock with a standing female figure holding in one hand a shield and in the other a victor's wreath over a trophy. Two reclining figures represent rivers near Avignon (the Rhone and the Durance)

the world-famous Big Ben clock (1849). Ornate and gilded, the faces are 23ft (7m) across and the copper minute hand of 14ft (4.2m) weighs 2cwts and travels 120 miles each year. The figures are 2ft (0.6m) long and the minute spaces are 1ft square. The pendulum is 14ft 5ins (4.4m) long

the clock is wound and checked 3 times a week and adjusted using old pennies. When the light on top is lit it indicates that Parliament is still sitting. Big Ben is in fact the name of the 13 ton bell that strikes the hour in the clock. It has a unique sound as the bell is cracked

the house has several interesting clocks including one by Thuillier of Paris (in the South-West Drawing Room), one by Maniere said to have belonged to the Emperor Napoleon when he was first Consul; and one with supporting allegorical figures of Architecture and Painting in the State Drawing Room

the precision clocks that you can see in the Observatory are replicas of the 17th century ones made by the horologist John Harrison (1693-1776) for telling the time

at sea. On the exterior of the building is a ball that slides down a mast at exactly 13.00 hours. Occurring since 1833 it enables seamen on the River Thames to set their clocks accurately by Greenwich Mean Time

another important item is the Shepherd 24-Hour Gate Clock. Installed in 1852 by Charles Shepherd this Galvano-Magnetic clock is known as the Master Clock as it brought coordinated time into existence. Its divisions are marked in Roman numerals

this City of London Livery Company owns some attractive clocks including a longcase by B L Vulliamy, a 1720s bouille-work bracket clock by Tallon of Paris (in the Court Room) and a painted and gilded musical clock of 1770 with Arabic numerals that was designed for the Turkish market. It has crystal pillars and domes and is topped by crescent and star finials (in the Drawing Room)

the Clock Court with mock Tudor gateway by William Kent is decorated with coats of arms, gargoyles and the Astronomical Clock of King Henry VIII dated 1540. This clock was made by Nicholas Ourslan for the King so that high water at London Bridge could be calculated, a useful piece of information when most travel was by royal barge along the River Thames. It has an 8ft dial and shows the hour, month, date, signs of the zodiac, the year and the phase of the moon. Predating Galileo it was made in a time when it was believed that the sun revolved round the earth

in the King's Closet there is a long-case clock made for King William III
