the Royal Ceremonial Dress Collection has interesting examples of embroidered men and women's clothes (suits, coats, waistcoats, knee breeches) often in silver & gold wire. The 18th century Dress Rooms include a 1780 suit in Beavais chain stitch and a velvet suit of 1790, both richly embroidered

besides that used to decorate clothing there is some other lovely embroidery including a 17th century Italian piece showing New Testament scenes. (In the Presence Chamber)

the crafts of British India are illustrated by arms, armour, carved screens, chintz and muslin, carpets, gold and silver thread embroidery and jewellery with enamel and semi-precious stones. More examples of embroidery come from the Himalayas and Nepal. A display of English embroidery covers 13th to 14th century ecclesiastical pieces, the Oxburgh hangings with their exotic animals, birds and flowers (1500s) and a Bradford table mat with border illustrating late 16th century life. The Oxburgh Hangings were embroidered by Mary, Queen of Scots and her prison warder Elizabeth, Countess of Shrewsbury the Costume Court shows the history of dress over four centuries (1540-1990) and includes Court mantua, shirts,

bodices, hooped skirts and suits covered with detailed embroidery

the embroidered kneeler at the sanctuary rail was begun in 1956. It is 24ft (7.3m) long and 17in (43cm) wide with 1,360,800 stitches and was stitched in memory of those of 600 City of London Squadron Royal Auxiliary Airforce who gave their lives in the 2nd World War. It was funded by congregation donations

with over 30,000 objects in the collection and regular changing displays, this museum focuses on the fashionable dress of men, women and children from the late 16th century to the present day. There are lovely examples of embroidery on some of the clothing and accessories, many dating from the 16th century study tables can be booked on Thursdays or Fridays in order to examine any item in the collection more closely
