Charles I

Trafalgar Square, WC2

the statue of King Charles I has the date '1632' engraved on the horse's left front foot. Sculptured by Hubert Le Sueur, it stands on a pedestal designed by Christopher Wren and carved by Grinling Gibbons. It has stood on the present site since 1675 and was given a new sword in 1947. The original armour is now in the Tower of London

the collection includes a painting by Francisco de Goya of the Duke of Wellington on horseback. Outside the Decimus Burton gates bear a horsemen motif that is based on a frieze from the Acropolis in Athens, part of which is in the British Museum

this statue shows Albert, husband to Queen Victoria, mounted on a horse; by Charles Bacon 1874

George IV

a statue of King George IV showing the king in classical Roman dress riding bareback on a horse, by Sir Francis Legatt Chantrey

George, 2nd Duke of Cambridge

opposite former War Office, Whitehall, SW1

transport: Westminster u/g, Charing Cross u/g & rail; buses 3,11,12,24,53,77A,88,159; boat Westminster Millennium Pier

this statue shows the Duke (1819-1904), Commander-in-Chief of the British Army 1856-1895, on horseback; by Captain Adrian Jones, 1907

Garnet Joseph, 1st Viscount Wolseley

Horse Guards Parade, Horse Guards Road, SW1

transport: Westminster u/g, Charing Cross u/g & rail; buses 3,11,12,24,53,77A,88,159; boat Westminster Millennium Pier

an equestrian statue of the Viscount (1833-1913) who led an attempt to relieve Gordon of Khartoum; by Sir William Goscombe John, 1920

Douglas, 1st Earl Haig

opposite Banqueting House, Whitehall, SW1

transport: Westminster u/g, Charing Cross u/g & rail; buses 3,11,12,24,53,77A,88,159; boat Westminster Millennium Pier

an equestrian statue of 1937 by Alfred F Hardiman. Earl Haig (1861-1928) was Commander of the British Expeditionary Force during the 1st World War and in the postwar years was the first president of the British Legion (for the care of ex-servicemen)

Richard 1 (Coeur-de-Lion)

Old Palace Yard, Abingdon Street, Westminster, SW1P

transport: Westminster u/g, Charing Cross u/g & rail; buses 3,11,12,24,53,77A,88,159,211; boat Westminster Millennium Pier

this statue shows the king (1157-1199) on his horse; by Baron Carlo Marochetti, c 1851

Marshal Ferdinand Foch

facing Victoria Station, SW1

transport: Victoria u/g & rail; buses 2,8,11,16,24,36,38,52,73,82,185,211,239,C1,C10

equestrian statue of the French Marshal (1851-1929), strategist of 1st World War battles. By G. Mallissard, 1930, it is a copy of a statue in Cassel, France

Edward VII

equestrian statue of King Edward VII; by Sir Bertram Mackennal, 1921

William III (William of Orange)

St James's Square, SW1

transport: Piccadilly Circus u/g, Charing Cross u/g & rail; buses 3,6,9,12,13,14,15,19,22,23,38,53,88,139,159

by J. Bacon the Younger in 1800, this statue shows the king on horseback. Under the horse's hooves can be seen the molehill which is said to have caused the accident at Hampton Court which resulted in the king's death

Arthur Wellesley, 1st Duke of Wellington

opposite Apsley House, Hyde Park Corner, W1

transport: Hyde Park Corner u/g; buses 2,8,9,10,14,16,19,22,36,38,52,73,74,82,137

this equestrian statue of 1887 by Sir Joseph Edgar Boehm was cast from captured guns. It shows the Duke, mounted on his horse Copenhagen. Around the statue are the guardsmen figures of a Grenadier, a Royal Highlander, a Welsh Fusilier and an Inniskilling Dragoon. It stands opposite Aspley House, at one time the Duke's London residence and now the home of the Wellington Museum

Robert Cornelius, 1st Baron Napier of Magdala

Queen's Gate, SW7

transport: Gloucester Road & South Kensington u/g; buses 9,10,49,52,70,74

a British field marshal, Napier of Magdala (1810-1890) was at various times commander-in-chief in India and Governor of Gibraltar. The statue is by Sir Joseph Edgar Boehm

Sir George White

Portland Place, W1

transport: Oxford Circus & Regent's Park u/g; buses 88, C2

a bronze statue shows the defender of Ladysmith (1835-1912) on horseback; by John Tweed, 1922

Arthur Wellesley, 1st Duke of Wellington

Cornhill, EC3

transport: Bank u/g, Fenchurch Street rail; buses 8,11,26,76,133,242

this statue to Wellington (1769-1852) was begun by Sir Francis Legatt Chantrey but finally completed by Henry Weekes in 1844

Frederick Sleight, 1st Earl Roberts of Kandahar, Pretoria and Waterford

Horse Guards Parade, Horse Guards Road, SW1

transport: Westminster u/g, Charing Cross u/g & rail; buses 3,11,12,24,53,77A,88,159; boat Westminster Millennium Pier

a British field marshal, Roberts (1832-1914) was commander-in-chief in India (1885-93) and supreme commander in South Africa during the Boer War. The statue of 1924 by Henry Bates is a smaller version of a statue in Calcutta, India

a bronze and marble statue by Alfred Steven of the Duke of Wellington (1769-1852) on his horse, Copenhagen, can be found in the north aisle. Dated 1912 it has a recumbent bronze effigy of the Duke at the base

Physical Energy

west bank of Long Water, Kensington Gardens, W2

transport: Queensway, Notting Hill Gate & High Street Kensington u/g; buses 9,10,12,49,52,70,94

a 12ft high bronze equestrian statue, by George Frederick Watts, representing Cecil Rhodes (1853-1902), colonial statesman, prime minister of Cape Colony, South Africa

(1890-6) and founder of De Beers Consolidated Mines Co.(1888). The naked male on the rearing horse symbolises energy and is a replica of part of a memorial to Rhodes at Groote Schuur, near Cape Town, South Africa

Queen Boadicea (Boudicca)

corner of Westminster Bridge opposite Houses of Parliament , SW1

transport: Westminster u/g; buses 3,11,12,24,53,77A, 88,159,211; boat Westminster Millennium Pier

*standing opposite Big Ben the 1902 statue by Thomas Thornycroft shows the British warrior queen and her two daughters in a chariot. Note the sharp blades projecting from the wheels. Boadicea was queen of the Iceni, a tribe living in what is now Norfolk and Suffolk who took up arms against the Romans after they seized her territory *and brutally treated the people. Legend has it that she was buried at Platform 10, King's Cross Station*

in October 2003 an equestrian statue of Queen Elizabeth II was unveiled in this Royal park. A statue of King George III called 'The Copper Horse' also stands in the Park. It was erected in 1831 and is by Sir Richard Westmacott
