the tomb of Mary Queen of Scots was erected by King James I. With eight posters it is marble effigy of the Queen showing her dressed in a close-fitting coif, lace ruff and mantle fastened with a brooch. A Scottish crowned lion lies at her feet

the oak Coronation Chair of King Edward I dates from 1300 and is decorated with birds, foliage and animals. It has the figure of the King on the back with his feet resting on a lion. The Chair used to house the Stone of Scone until it was returned to Scotland in 1997. It is now housed in Edinburgh Castle but will be returned to London for the coronation of a new monarch

lions are on the memorial gates that commemorate first-class cricket batsman and bowler, William Gilbert Grace (1848-1915). These main entrance gates are also decorated with the initials 'WGG', cricket stumps, bats, bat & ball

Chindit Special Force Memorial

Victoria Embankment- next to former Canon Row police station, SW1

this 1990 memorial commemorates the men of the Chindit Special Force who fought against the Japanese in Burma during 1943 and 1944. The name was derived from the Chinthe of Burma mythology; a mythical lion-like beast that was the Guardian of Burmese Temples. The motto associated with the Chindit is 'boldest measures are the safest'. The memorial is by Frank Forster (sculptor) and David Price (architect)

the grave to John Stow who died in 1605 shows him holding a quill pen. The memorial is decorated with lions' heads, books and crosses. Stowe wrote the first detailed account of the City of London in 1598. At a service every April 5th the quill pen is replaced and a copy of his book presented to the writer of the best essay about London

this is a copy of a 10th century Viking granite stone with runic inscription, red and white interlaced scrolls and the image of Christ and a lion in the grip of a serpent. It was

erected in memory of King Gorm of Denmark, 1st Danish ruler to be converted to Christianity and is a copy of the stone at Jelling, Jutland erected in 980AD by Harald of Denmark

this lion statue has dominated the south end of Westminster Bridge since 1952. Made in 1837 of Coade Stone it is 13ft long and 12ft high and has its paw inscribed with the sculptor's name (W.F Woodington) and the date. It was formerly the mascot of the 19th century Red Lion Brewery that stood nearby

The piece is by John Michael Rysback

this museum has a model of the High Wycombe Red Lion. The Red Lion became a famous landmark of Wycombe as it appeared in pictures of both Benjamin Disraeli (1832) and Sir Winston Churchill (1946) making speeches to the crowd outside the Red Lion Hotel in the High Street. The original lion is now above the porch of Woolworths in the High Street and is all that remains of the Red Lion Hotel

George III

this statue of 1788 shows the King as an imperial admiral dressed in a toga and supporting himself on a rudder with a lion & antique boat prow at his feet. A baroque former fountain of a river god representing the River Thames is in the foreground. The piece is by John Bacon the Elder

look over the parapet into the river - the mooring rings are lions with rings through their mouths,

Holborn Viaduct, EC1

Holborn Viaduct is a three-span iron bridge on granite piers which originally spanned the valley of the River Fleet and Farringdon Street. Built in 1896 it is 1400ft (427m) long and 80ft(24m) wide

it has bronze statues of City notables and four figures deoicting Commerce with open hand, money and a key to the City; Agriculture with a scythe, corn & belt; Science with an instrument for measuring the speed of a steam engine and a globe with Zodiac signs; Fine Art with drawing sheet & pen and pallet & brush on the floor. Two pairs of bronze winged lions stand at either end

India House

this 19th century building has interesting external decoration. The two columns on either side of the door have lion heads and the two columns above the door sides have elephant sculptures at the bottom, lions at the

top and a three-headed lion. Further decoration in the form of roundels on the walls show peacocks, a lion, a ship, fish, a river, a cobra, trees and camels

York House Watergate

a little of the original 17th century woodcarving of Grinling Gibbons can be found in the church - on the posts under the galleries and in the lion and unicorn on the Royal Pew. The beasts are shown with fish tails to emphasise the nautical associations of the church

Horse Guards was built in 1745 to act as the official entrance to Buckingham Palace and that is why it is still guarded by the sovereign's troops. It stands on three sides round a forecourt with a central arch and clock tower. One of the buildings has lion columns supporting domes with further lions on the dome tops a Turkish gun stands on the Parade Ground. It was made by a Chief Gunner in 1524 and captured in Egypt by the British army in 1801. It is decorated with lions' heads, a crocodile, a lion pointing to the Pyramids and a sphinx. The inscription reads 'the [song] of the age, the great sultan commander ordered dragon guns to be made; when they breath roaring like thunder may the enemy's forts be razed to the ground. The year of hegira 931'
