over 8 million items are kept by the National Library of which 80,000 are on display. Collections include: the Bonjanowitz Polish Collection specialising in stamps issued between 1939 and 1946 including those from the German and Russian occupations and from Prisoner of War camps; Turner (railway letter stamps); Tapling (whole world 19th century), Mosely (British Africa to 1935), Langmead (Great Britain and Ireland telegraph stamps), Chapel (Mauritius and postal history), Fitzgerald (airmails), and Model (Germany 1945-6)

the only pub in Britain licensed to sell both British and American postage stamps

Sir Rowland Hill

this 1881 statue was erected as a memorial to Sir Rowland Hill (1795-1879), the originator of the penny postage which was introduced in Britain in 1840. By Onslow R Ford it was moved here in 1923 from its original position outside the Royal Exchange. Its present location is outside the former home of the National Postal Museum

this was the home of Sir Rowland Hill between 1839 and 1845

the archive records preserved in this major post office sorting office date from the 17th century to the present day and cover administration, the development of services including stamps, broadcasting, the Post Office Savings Bank and the distribution of mail. This building may become the future home of the National Postal Museum but a decision has yet to be made - watch this space!

this Victorian cemetery of 40 acres was originally the 'West of London & Westminster Cemetery' and has some notable graves among its 200,000. One belongs to Henry Cole (1808-82) who was director of the Victoria and Albert Museum. In 1842 he had the first Christmas card published and sent to his friends using the Penny Black postage stamp (printed 1840) that required the sender instead of the recipient to pay the postage
