the museum has a collection of 15 marine chronometers including that of 1724 by Henry Sully, a silver deck watch by Thomas Earnshaw, and John Harrison's 5th Marine Timekeeper of 1770

it also displays the 700 timepieces of the Company of Clockmakers, a City of London Livery Company. These date from between the 15th and 20th centuries and range from 600 English and European watches to longcase clocks. It is the oldest collection in the world. The Museum also houses the library of the Clockmakers Company with books and manuscripts dating from 1813

history of time-keeping and time measurement from water clocks to quartz watches. A medieval mechanism from Wells Cathedral strikes every quarter of an hour

the precision clocks in the Octagon Room and Chronometer Gallery are replicas of the 17th century ones made by the horologist John Harrison (1693-1776) for telling the time at sea. On the exterior of the building is a ball that slides down a mast at exactly 13.00 hours. Occurring since 1833 it enables seamen on the River Thames to set their clocks accurately

another important item is the Shepherd 24-Hour Gate Clock. Installed in 1852 by Charles Shepherd this Galvano-Magnetic clock is known as the Master Clock as it brought coordinated time into existence. Its divisions are marked in Roman numerals

the Observatory is the home of Greenwich Mean Time (GMT), the Prime Meridian Line (Longitude Zero) which is a brass strip in the floor and Airy's Transit Circle where crossed hairs determine the meridian. The Prime Meridian was adopted in 1852 by Britain, in 1883 by USA and internationally in 1884. The brass strip can also be seen outside the Observatory where it is possible to stand with

a foot in both east and west hemispheres at the same time.

outside the Observatory is the 1996 Meridian Sculpture. It has an abstract central tubular shaft with centrally attached circular rim suspended from 4 wires. Made of stainless steel it is set at an angle in line with the Prime Meridian like a gyroscope. The Meridian track running to it has electronic news feed

a world-famous store, it has an art deco clock supported by an allegorical figure of the Queen of Time riding on a ship of commerce. It was sculptured by Gilbert Bayes

'Timepiece' is a 12ft diameter sundial supported by 3 handforged steel chains. It is set at 56 degrees & the pointer is parallel to the earth's axis and pointing true north; by Wendy Taylor 1973

an old hour glass as used by the chaplain has been kept although the pulpit was removed in 1939

obelisk

an 18th century stone obelisk marks the terrestrial meridian. It was used by Kew Observatory along with movement of the stars to calculate and set the time for Horse Guards Parade and Parliament. Unfortunately it can only be seen from the tow path as it is obscured by scrubwood

the décor of this pub reflects the docks and includes a bell. The name refers to the site formerly being an abbatoir (bladebone) and the 5 bells which indicated the end of lunchtime in docks

cricket. Amongst the memorabilia are bats, balls, bails, an urn containing the Ashes, portraits of famous members and Staffordshire pottery figurines of cricketers.

the Millennium Sundial is a triangular bronze gnomon set in a stone and marble circle. It stands on the Prime Meridian that is marked by a bronze strip running to the edge of the circle dial - a circle of stone slabs with Roman numeral hours. Eventually it will be surrounded by 12 small 'human' sundials showing the time in 12 cities in 12 different time zones. The shadow of the human will tell the time

a small gaslit court of 18th century houses has an astrolabe sundial in its centre

Time Spiral

this 1996 piece of sculpture by Malcolm Robertson is a three-faced spiral of stainless steel with a clock face on each of the three sides. It is set in a circle with compass points, gold lettering and signs of the zodiac emphasising the themes of time, travel & transport
